

glues, polyvinyl acetate, and enamels were potentially used to display and reconstruct some associated funerary objects in the past. Apart from this, HMoA has no knowledge or record of any additional potentially hazardous substances being used to treat the human remains or associated funerary objects.

Human remains representing, at least, one individual have been identified. No associated funerary objects are present. On an unknown date, human remains (Ancestor) were removed from an unknown location. On an unknown date, the Ancestor was transferred to the HMoA by an unknown individual. On August 29, 1988, the HMoA filled out an American Association of Museums Collections Survey documenting the presence of the Ancestor. Based on the acquisition history of the HMoA Native American Collection, it is possible the Ancestor was removed from West Virginia. The Ancestor is missing in collection. HMoA has no knowledge or record of the presence of any potentially hazardous substances used to treat the human remains.

Cultural Affiliation

Based on the information available and the results of consultation, cultural affiliation is reasonably identified by the geographical location and acquisition history of the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice.

Determinations

The HMoA has determined that:

- The human remains described in this notice represent the physical remains of five individuals of Native American ancestry.
- The 117 objects described in this notice are reasonably believed to have been placed intentionally with or near individual human remains at the time of death or later as part of the death rite or ceremony.
- There is a connection between the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice and the Absentee-Shawnee Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma; Bay Mills Indian Community, Michigan; Catawba Indian Nation; Cayuga Nation; Cherokee Nation; Chickahominy Indian Tribe—Eastern Division; Chippewa Cree Indians of the Rocky Boy's Reservation, Montana; Delaware Tribe of Indians; Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians; Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma; Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, Michigan; Kaw Nation, Oklahoma; Keweenaw Bay Indian Community, Michigan; Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior

Chippewa Indians of Wisconsin; Lac du Flambeau Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians of the Lac du Flambeau Reservation of Wisconsin; Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians of Montana; Minnesota Chippewa Tribe, Minnesota (Component reservations: Bois Forte Band (Nett Lake); Fond du Lac Band; Grand Portage Band; Leech Lake Band; White Earth Band); Monacan Indian Nation; Nansemond Indian Nation; Omaha Tribe of Nebraska; Oneida Indian Nation; Oneida Nation; Onondaga Nation; Pamunkey Indian Tribe; Ponca Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma; Ponca Tribe of Nebraska; Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians of Wisconsin; Red Lake Band of Chippewa Indians, Minnesota; Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan; Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe; Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians, Michigan; Seneca Nation of Indians; Seneca-Cayuga Nation; Shawnee Tribe; St. Croix Chippewa Indians of Wisconsin; The Osage Nation; Tonawanda Band of Seneca; Tunica-Biloxi Indian Tribe; Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians of North Dakota; Tuscarora Nation; United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians in Oklahoma; and the Wyandotte Nation.

Requests for Repatriation

Written requests for repatriation of the human remains and associated funerary objects in this notice must be sent to the authorized representative identified in this notice under **ADDRESSES**. Requests for repatriation may be submitted by:

1. Any one or more of the Indian Tribes or Native Hawaiian organizations identified in this notice.
2. Any lineal descendant, Indian Tribe, or Native Hawaiian organization not identified in this notice who shows, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the requestor is a lineal descendant or an Indian Tribe or Native Hawaiian organization with cultural affiliation.

Repatriation of the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice to a requestor may occur on or after April 27, 2026. If competing requests for repatriation are received, the HMoA must determine the most appropriate requestor prior to repatriation. Requests for joint repatriation of the human remains and associated funerary objects are considered a single request and not competing requests. The HMoA is responsible for sending a copy of this notice to the Indian Tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations identified in this notice and any other consulting parties.

SUMMARY: In accordance with the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), California State University, Chico (Chico State) has completed an inventory of associated funerary objects and has determined that there is a cultural affiliation between the associated funerary objects and Indian Tribes or Native Hawaiian organizations in this notice.

DATES: Repatriation of the associated funerary objects in this notice may occur on or after April 27, 2026.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: This notice is published as part of the National Park Service's administrative responsibilities under NAGPRA. The determinations in this notice are the sole responsibility of Chico State, and additional information on the determinations in this notice, including the results of consultation, can be found in its inventory or related records. The National Park Service is not responsible for the determinations in this notice.

Abstract of Information Available

The two associated funerary objects are one lot of modified obsidian pieces and one lot of shells. The associated funerary objects originate from Siskiyou County. The associated funerary objects were located with human remains also originating from Siskiyou County who were previously determined to be of the Karuk Tribe and currently being repatriated.

The University is unaware of any treatment of the associated funerary objects listed above with pesticides, preservatives, or other substances that represent a potential hazard to the objects or to persons handling the objects.

Cultural Affiliation

Based on the information available and the results of consultation, cultural affiliation is reasonably identified by the geographical location or acquisition history of the associated funerary objects described in this notice.

Determinations

Chico State has determined that:

- The two lots of objects described in this notice are reasonably believed to have been placed intentionally with or near individual human remains at the time of death or later as part of the death rite or ceremony.
- There is a connection between the associated funerary objects described in this notice and the Karuk Tribe.

Requests for Repatriation

Written requests for repatriation of the associated funerary objects in this notice must be sent to the authorized representative identified in this notice under **ADDRESSES**. Requests for repatriation may be submitted by:

1. Any one or more of the Indian Tribes or Native Hawaiian organizations identified in this notice.
2. Any lineal descendant, Indian Tribe, or Native Hawaiian organization not identified in this notice who shows, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the requestor is a lineal descendant or an Indian Tribe or Native Hawaiian organization with cultural affiliation.

Repatriation of the associated funerary objects described in this notice to a requestor may occur on or after April 27, 2026. If competing requests for repatriation are received, Chico State must determine the most appropriate requestor prior to repatriation. Requests for joint repatriation of the associated funerary objects are considered a single request and not competing requests. Chico State is responsible for sending a copy of this notice to the Indian Tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations identified in this notice and any other consulting parties.

SUMMARY: Notice is hereby given that the U.S. International Trade Commission ("Commission") is requesting submissions on whether the exclusion orders issued in the above-captioned Commission investigations should be modified or rescinded, in whole or in part, based on changed conditions of fact or law, or the public interest.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The Commission issued exclusion orders in each of the following investigations based on complaints alleging violations of section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended, 19 U.S.C. 1337 ("section 337"), by reason of trademark infringement, as well as patent infringement and/or copyright infringement in certain investigations:

Certain Portable Power Stations and Packaging Therefor, Inv. No. 337-TA-563, Limited Exclusion Order (Trademark, Copyright, and Patent) (Nov. 6, 2006); *Certain Radio Control Hobby Transmitters and Receivers and Products Containing Same*, Inv. No. 337-TA-763, Limited Exclusion Order (Trademark, Copyright, and Patent) (Sept. 27, 2011); *Certain Computer Cables, Chargers, Adapters, Peripheral Devices and Packaging Containing the Same*, Inv. No. 337-TA-975, Limited Exclusion Order (Trademark Only) (Oct. 13, 2016); *Certain Arrowheads with Deploying Blades and Components Thereof*, Inv. No. 337-TA-977, General Exclusion Order (Trademark and Patent) (Apr. 6, 2017); *Certain Portable Battery Jump Starters and Components Thereof*, Inv. No. 337-TA-1256, Limited Exclusion Order (Trademark Only) (Aug. 29, 2022). Each exclusion order requires that the complainant(s) in the investigation make annual filings with the Commission stating, *inter alia*, whether they continue to use the trademarks listed in the exclusion orders in commerce.

In each of these investigations, the complainants have recently failed to comply with the annual filing requirement, and the Commission has notified the respective complainants of their non-compliance but received no response from any complainant. In addition, in Inv. No. 337-TA-563 the asserted patent appears to have expired, and the asserted trademark has been canceled by the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office due to a failure to file a declaration of continued use. *See* U.S. Trademark Registration No. 2,594,538, Canceled/Expired (USPTO Trademark Status & Document Retrieval, Feb. 22, 2013).

The Commission is therefore requesting submissions from the public, including the current owners of the trademarks at issue, on whether these exclusion orders should be modified or rescinded under 19 U.S.C. 1337(k) and 19 CFR 210.76, in whole or in part, to account for any trademarks that have been abandoned, cancelled, or rendered invalid or unenforceable. The Commission notes that some of the exclusion orders also cover copyrights and patents. Accordingly, the Commission is also requesting submissions from the public, including the parties to the investigations, the current owners of the copyrights and patents named in the orders, or successors-in-interest, interested government agencies, and any other interested parties on whether these exclusion orders should be modified or rescinded, in whole or in part, based on
